KRAFT TO DRIVE

Senior Class **New Buildings**

• The Senior Class of 1940 has just voted to give some of their finances to the building of a new women's dorm and a new science building. With the enrollment at 25,000 these buildings are essential to the continuance of the efficiency of the college. With the huge enrollment there have been many buildings all over the campus but space remains still which is reserved for these two buildings.

While other buildings were springing up all around, the women's dorm fund and the science building fund have not increased more than a dollar a year. A space is still reserved on Comstock Field for the new dorm, plans for which were drawn up in 1848 A.D. when Earlham Hall became too crowded, just one year after the college was opened.

The Senior Class resolved to remedy this difficulty and have now made their wishes public. "Expense is not to be spared" said Dave Hawk, president. "We'll foot the bill, no matter the cost."

Besides these two donations the class also unanimously consented to buy a new water fountain for Carpenter Hall. It will be installed tomorrow.

Announce Plans For Building Swimming Pool

Four hundred and fifty students will begin excavations for the new swimming pool, to be located on the Heart in front of Earlham Hall, immediately after Spring vacation. President Dennis has been using all his persuasive powers on the Board of Trustees for several years, but it was just this week that the Board gave their unanimous consent.

The principle use of the new swimming pool will be for the girls of Earlham Hall to dive into during fire drills. Huge lights will be placed around the pool and they will automatically be turned on when the fire drill signal is given.

KRAFT VICTIM OF PAINFUL To Donate Many AND UNFORTUNATE AILMENT

5 Students Out For Unamerican Activities

• "The subversive influence of politics must be kept out of Earlham at all cost," said President Dennis, when he expelled five students yesterday. Four sophomores and a freshman have been asked to leave for spreading aggressive war propaganda in favor of Germany. The Dennis Committee of Investigation of un-American Activities revealed to the board that Bill Hale, Earl Fowler, Lowell Cox, Wayne Guernsey and Butch Wright are in the pay of the dreaded Nazi Bund. They are charged with setting up a recruiting bureau to fight the Allies through the local Student Peace Volunteers. Cox and Miss Wright were caught redhanded with large quantities of pro-war propaganda by Miss Geist, when she came to throw them out of the libe basement for making too much noise. Fowler, who has just finished two plays and sixteen poems proving the beauty and necessity of war, was caught misappropriating 16 cents from the treasury of the Peace group for a fund to buy Germany an airplane. Hale and Guernsey are in league with these three. The group issued a statement "As members of the Peace Volunteers, we have made a careful study of the situation, and find that there is no way out but making the world safe for totalitarianism."

According to statistics collected from universities and colleges throughout the country this number makes Earlham the largest educational institution in the country. It is now possible to take any type of course at Earlham that a student may want.

In announcing this figure the Head Registrar, Miss Thornburg, gave credit for the splendid increase over last year to hardworking Robert Huff and goodlooking Lawrence Leland. The latter's influence explains the large number of beautiful women now enrolled. Of course these two men have a huge staff to aid them.

The publicity department of the university is still under the direction of Paul Ingels, now head of the College of Advertising. It was through his office that Earlham's chapel programs were so publicized as to play to Standing Room Only at 35 cents per seat. That their efforts have been so recognized has been a continual source of amazement to Earlham's faculty who furnish the programs.

In his advertising material Mr. Ingels has been aided by the splendid new buildings added to the campus. The new men's dorm is the last word in modern comfort and efficiency and has been built with special smoking parlors where students may entertain friends.

The instrument used was a murderouslooking black foot.

Today the Administration disclosed that Dr. Kraft will transport the Earlham college student teachers to and from their various schools in the new college Cadillac '40, when he recovers from his recent malady.

G-Men cracked the case when they allegedly observed Sally Giest putting copies of the "Daily Worker" in the fan mail. Sally Giest and Elizabeth (Butch) Wright, believed to be leaders of the party, are being held without bail in the Wayne County Jail. More arrests are expected at any moment.

In view of the brutal nature of her crime "Mike" will be held without bail until the day of the trial, which will be Monday morning, April first.

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Fowler Named **Candidate** For Nobel Award

Fowler's gift for depicting with brutal realism the horrors of war came into full play in this latest production of his pen, and his verbal rendition of the play left his hearers too weakened and nerve-shattered to enjoy to the fullest the delicious refreshments served by the Misses Davis. Fowler is being considered by the Nobel commission, established by the famous inventor of dynamite, Albert Nobel, to receive this year's prize for his play, and all lovers of peace are rooting for him to get not only the drama prize but also the prize granted to the person most instrumental in popularizing peace on earth this year. Besides fostering Fowler, Anglican's latest understanding is the production of the annual Scrapbook, which is a collection of the best literary works of students for the year. If finances can be managed it is planned to have the Scrapbook printed this time, instead of the usual mimeographing; printing makes a much classier job. 


