NOBLESVILLE HIGH SCHOOL WINS HONORS IN STATE MEET

WALTON SECURES MEET BY THREE FIRSTS

Two Hundred Athletes Make Great Showing In Events Hotly Contested. Six Heats Required in Dashes. Crawfordsville Takes Relay and Fairmount Breaks Shot Put Record Four Inches

Upon a fast track and in the best of weather the Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association on Reid Field this afternoon was won by Noblesville High School by the close margin of two points over Fairmount Academy, which took second with 14½ points and Manual Training High School, which took third with 12 points. The relay race was won in the fast time of 3 minutes and 43 seconds by Crawfordsville High School.

Tie in Pole Vault

Gaddis, of Fairmount, Academy, and Cook, of Boswell, tied for first in the pole vault at ten feet. Both men showed good form, but were unable to approach the record mark. The little man from Boswell looked like a sure winner early in the event, but was unable to go beyond the husky Fairmount man. Mittank of Fairmount Academy, and Dixon, of Linton, tied for third place.

Shot Record Broken

In the shot put, Morrish, of Fairmount Academy, broke the state record of 43 feet, 9½ inches by 4½ inches, putting the ball 44 feet 2 inches. He easily outclassed all his competitors. Hawthorth, of Amo, took second place and Roney, of Fairmount High School, took third. The record was held by Kern, of Salem.

Crawfordsville Wins Relay

Crawfordsville won the relay from Evansville by inches. The Crawfordsville team led the entire race, Jones taking a lead of twenty yards and holding it until the last lap. Evansville ran second the last two laps, but Lindsay could not overcome the lead of the Crawfordsville man.

880-Yd. Run

In the half mile run, Milholland, of M. T. H. S., led the bunch of twenty runners up to the last 100 yards, when Sheets, of Frankfort, passed him, winning first place. Milholland came in third, Kelly, of South Bend, beating him out, for second honors at the finish. The race was close from start to finish, the runners sparring for every inch of ground gained and all finishing within a few yards of the winners. The time of 2:09 was only two seconds under the state record.

McAlvey Wins Low Hurdles

The low hurdles were run in

two heats and a final. In the first heat McAlvey, of Crawfordsville, came in first, with Clover, of Noblesville, a close second. In the second heat Brug, of South Bend, easily outstripped all his opponents, making the race in 28.2-5 seconds. Richter, of Plymouth, and L. Armstrong, of Westfield, were tied for second place in this heat.

The final was an excellent race. South Bend was eager for more points and Noblesville, not coming up to expectations, was working hard for points.

In the finals, McAlvey, of Crawfordsville, took first place in 28 seconds flat, in a very exciting race. Brug, of South Bend, took second and Richter, of Plymouth, third.

100-Yd. Dash Easy

In one of the prettiest races of the meet, Walton, of Noblesville, beat out Cornelius, of M. T. H. S., by a few feet in the 100-yard dash. All of the heats were close, Walton, of Noblesville, taking the first in easy style, and Cornelius winning his heat in faster time than Walton. Both took easy firsts in the semi-finals. The Training School lad ran a faster race than Walton to win his event, but the sprinter from Noblesville lowered the time in the final, winning in 10.3-5 seconds. Cornelius was right behind him at the tape and deserves praise for his work. Lindsey, of Evansville, took a good third in the event. In the heats Walton, Winter of Manual, Roach of Linton and Codier, of South Bend, each won their races in 11 seconds flat.

Walton Repeats Trick

Easily repeating his trick of the 100 yard dash, Walton, of Noblesville, ran away from his contestants and without any great effort, annexed first place for Noblesville in the 220 yard

dash, making the sprint in the fast time of 24 flat, with Armstrong, of Westfield, second.

The race was run in three heats, the first going to Cordier, of South Bend, in 24.4-5, the second to Roach, of Linton, who made the best time of 24.3-5 seconds in the preliminary heats. Walton took his heat in 24.4-5. All of the heats were close, the seconds and thirds finishing in blanket bunches. The time of the final was only one second slower than the record held by Blair, of Hammond. By taking the event, Walton repeated his feat of last year of taking first place in both the dashes.

Monahan Takes High

Jumping against a small field, Monahan, of Fairmount, took the high jump at 5 feet 6 inches. The lanky man from Grant county, cleared every height on his first trial. He took his three trials at the state record of 5 ft. 9½ in., but failed by a fraction of an inch. Coffman, of M. T. H. S. took second with Wishard, of Greenwood, and H. Cottingham, of Noblesville, tying for the third place.

Manual Wins Mile

Brown, of M. T. H. S., took the mile in easy fashion with Good, of New Augusta, second. Clement, of M. T. H. S., led the first two laps, but his team-mate took the lead just before the start of the last lap and was never headed. Congdon, of Elkhart, was a close third and was pushed hard by Dages, of Muncie. The time of 4:48.4-5 was faster than most college races.

Sims Scores a First

The 440 yard dash, run in two heats was won on time, by D. Sims, of Bloomfield, in the last 100 yards of the first heat, Grimes of Crawfordsville, leading up to that time. Sims showed good head work, laying back and depending on his ability to make a strong sprint to win the race. Esby of M. T. H. S., led in the second heat, but was passed near the close of the race by Lindsey, of Evansville, who did the same trick that Sims had pulled off. His time was under the 54.2-5 of Sims, and he was given second place. H. Cottingham, of Noblesville, taking third.

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SECOND STATE MEET NEXT WEEK

I. C. A. L. ON REID FIELD

Number of Entries Largest in Years, Giving Promise of Record-Breaking Competition in All Events

In the annual track and field meet of the Indiana College Athletic League, which will be held on Reid Field one week from today, making the second state meet to be held on the local field this season, fast racing and record breaking time is promised. The number of entries is larger than it has been for several years, every college in the league but one being represented, and every team gives promise of making some record breaking competition in both field and track events.

Wabash and Earlham will no doubt be the two highest bidders for first place in the meet Saturday, and either has a possibility of winning.

Johnson and Staggs in Dashes

In the hundred yard dash, Johnson, of Earlham, has the best time of any of the possible winners. Staggs, of Wabash, and Guthrie, of DePauw, will push him hardest. The record of 10 seconds was made by Conrad, of Earlham.

In the 220 yard dash, Staggs, Johnson, Lockwood, of DePauw, and Cox, of Earlham, will make an exciting finish. Record by Conrad, of Earlham, 22.2-5 seconds.

In the quarter, Johnson and Staggs will make a pretty race. Second place will lie between Cox, of Earlham, Hurd, of Wabash, and Abbott, of Franklin. Brown, of Earlham, holds the record of 50.2-5.

Runs May Be Slow.

Hurd, of Wabash, will easily trot away with first place in the half-mile. Myers, of DePauw Cox, of Earlham, and Gibson, of Wabash, will race for the minor honors. Coppock, of Earlham, made the record of 2 min. 5.1-2 seconds.

Gavitt, of Wabash, ought to take first in the Mile Run, French, of DePauw and Stuart, of Rose Poly, probably trailing him in second and third positions. Reed,

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Hurdles to Anderson

Although by no means approaching the state record of 16 1-5 seconds in the low hurdles, the race was a pretty one, there being so many evenly contesting candidates. The first heat was won in 19 1-5 by Vermillion, of Anderson, Brug, of South Bend, having been disqualified for knocking over the last hurdle. L. Armstrong, of Westfield, ran a fine race in 17 2-5 in the second heat, with Thomas, of Seymour, a close second.

In the finals L. Armstrong, of Westfield, and Thomas, of Seymour, were disqualified, and Vermillion, of Anderson, took first in 17 2-5 seconds. Hoskins, of Carmel was second.

Discus Goes to Gaddis

Gaddis, of Fairmount Academy, threw the discus 107 feet, the state record being 117 ft. 6 in. It was thought the distance would have been greater, but Gaddis was not pushed. Vater, of Whiting, took second and Wisheart, of Crawfordsville, third. Gaddis showed good form and made easy throws in every trial.

In both the high and the low hurdles, Earlham looks good for first place by Roberts, Sherer, of Wabash, Benedict, of DePauw, and Wolcott, of Wabash, fighting it out for second and third. White, of Earlham, holds both records, the 120 yard at 16 2-5, and the 220 yard at 26 2-5 seconds.

Johnson and Brubaker, who both jump over 21 ft. are counted on to tally 8 points for the Quakers in the broad jump. Ellis, of Wabash, and House, of DePauw, contesting for third. Turk, of Rose Polly, holds the record of 22 ft. 13-4 in.

W. Roberts, of Earlham, who is vaulting 11 ft., will in his present form easily pluck first honors in the event and Stonnex, of DePauw, is expected to take second.

better records in the hammer throw than the I. C. A. L. record of 124 ft. 10½ inches, and will probably tally in the event in the order named. Stanley and Thistlethwaite, of Earlham, should take first and second in the shot put with Hurd, of Wabash, third. Brown, of Wabash, holds the record of 42 ft. 8 in. Craven, of Wabash, who has a record of 130 ft. in the discus, 17 ft. better than the record, should win first in that event, but he often shows bad form and Stanley, of Earlham, may take the event.

Figuring the scores as doped out by the above figures Earlham ought to take the meet by a close margin over Wabash, with DePauw a close third. The second and third places may fall on either Earlham or Wabash's side and turn the balance.

HIGH SCHOOL MAN BECAME COLLEGE STAR



Roy C. Conrad made his first appearance on Reid Field six years ago in the State High School Track Meet. The next year, wearing the yellow and white, he began his career as Earlham's greatest athlete, and hung up records unequalled in the Middle West. He ran the hundred in 9½ three times in two years; the 220 in 21½, and the quarter in 48. In the four years that he was on the Earlham team, he totaled over 350 points for his Alma Mater.

HIGH AS I. C. A. L. WINNERS

WIN FIVE OF ELEVEN MEETS

Quaker Track History an Interesting Story in Lowered Records and Great Athletes

The eleventh annual Indiana College Athletic League track and field meet is to be held at Earlham next Saturday. Earlham's prospects for winning the meet are good and this year's team must fly high to maintain the record of the past few years. Earlham's history in track has always been a source of pride to the Quakers. Of the eleven meets that have been held, Earlham has won five, Wabash three and State Normal one, the others being ties. In all the years that Earlham has competed in the state meet, she has never fallen below second place.

The phenomenal rise in Earlham track athletics began in 1909 and ten of the fourteen college track records has been broken since that time.

In 1910 Earlham had the premier track team of all the secondary colleges of Indiana and Ohio. The following table will show the work of this team in a single season:

Records at opening and at the close respectively.

100-Yd Dash—10 2-5, 9 4-5.

220-Yd Dash—22 3-5, 21 2-5.

H. Jump—5 ft. 9 in., 5 ft. 10½ in.

B. Jump—21 ft. 9 in., 22 ft. 4 in.

Discus—107 ft. 6 in., 110 ft. 2 in.

Shot Put—37 ft., 39 ft. 9 in.

P. Vault—10 ft. 6 in., 11 ft. 17½ in.

The season of 1911 was an equally successful one, four records were broken and the I. C. A. L. won. This was the first team to take the I. C. A. L. three years in succession, 1909, 1910 and 1911 respectively, Wabash having won it in 1907 and 1908. It was during this season that the Earlham relay team, composed of Stanley, Barnhart, Brown and Conrad, ran the mile in the remarkable time of 3 min. 25½ sec. in the A. A. U. Meet held at Dayton, Ohio. This was one-fifth of a second better than the time made at the Pennsylvania relay carnival that same spring, and was the best time made in the United States in 1911. In the same race, Conrad ran the 440 in 48 seconds under the watches of A. A. U. officials.

Last year's team tied Indiana, made a remarkably creditable showing against Purdue, and after a hard fight dropped the I. C. A. L. to the Scarlet by the narrow margin of 4 points. The team this year looks good and ought to do something next Saturday. The prospects for next year are bright as only one "E" man graduates this year, and there is no question but that Earlham track athletics will continue to remain upon the high plane in which they are at the present time.
